

Learning Academy

Agri-Resource Centres

One-stop agricultural service centre

Services Offered:

- Tractor services, access to land, cooperative registrations, training and workshops, advisory services and agricultural inputs
- Production plans, technical support- and facilitate access to markets

Food Security Programmes

Food Distribution

- 12-14 kg of vegetable pack to assessed indigent families.
- Encouraged to establish own backyard gardens
- Short term Hunger alleviation strategy





Food Gardens

- Backyard Gardens: Tea-Spoon sized seeds packs
- Communal Gardens:

 1 Hectares Land
 Schools, Clinics, Dumping sites,

Long-Term StrategicApproach

Empowerment Zones

Established on city-owned land and have the following elements:

- Large farm of at least 05 hectares under cultivation established via competitive proposal call with private sector partners.
- Minimum of 05 hectares distributed in 1-2 hectare via the Agri-resource centre to small-scale farmers
- Four food empowerment zones have been established in the City ranging from 5ha to 270ha

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Organic Farming Project (UNEP, GEF & ADBS / CoJ Collaboration)

Co- funded program (1 million dollar)
Fifteen projects agricultural projects for conversion
Goals:

- Improve farming infrastructure, improving quality of the soil, increase the soil microorganisms (fauna and flora), improve the soil health.
- Access to organic or untreated seeds, access to tractor service, advisory and technical services (organic farming),
- Identify organic markets and business support.
- Research and policy development
- Training and development (COJ officials & farmers)

Boosting food security in urban areas

Agro processing and value adding

- Aspiring and existing agro processors register on the COJ database
- Needs analysis of the client
- Depended on resource availability COJ provide (packaging material and necessary equipment)
- Access to information on funding, branding,
 market access, available facilities for placement
- Training and development

Agro processing Hubs

- Two hubs in Regions A & G service small farms
 within the Coj as a central processing point
- Used as market day centres for agroprocessors and for selling of different vegetables to the communities.
- More than 30 smallholder farmers have access to the hubs for cleaning, packing, grading and distribution to formal and informal markets.
